REPORT FROM THE CHAIRMAN AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Menzies Foundation has enjoyed another successful year in 2012, with a balanced budget, and a number of significant events to lift its public profile.

At the Annual General Meeting in May, the Foundation was honoured to welcome Professor David De Kretser AC, former Governor of Victoria, who gave a fascinating presentation based on his research into infertility and healthy ageing.

In September, the Foundation welcomed Professor Julian Savulescu, Professor of Practical Ethics at the University of Oxford and a former Menzies Scholar,

The Menzies Foundation was established in 1979 as a non-political, not-for-profit organisation to honour the memory of Sir Robert Menzies, Australia's longest-serving Prime Minister.

The Foundation supports a prestigious program of scholarships in allied health, engineering, law and medical research, with the flexibility to develop other activities of potential national importance.

The Foundation has also nurtured excellence in health research through its three daughter institutions. Our strategic investment in helping to establish those centres in earlier years has given the Foundation substantial leverage and visibility for the Menzies name, and made a contribution to the national research endeavour in areas of particular need.

to deliver the inaugural Menzies Scholars Lecture. Professor Savulescu explored the ethical implications of diagnosing and treating normal human traits such as shyness and eccentricity, and took many questions from the enthusiastic audience.

In November, at the Annual Awards dinner for Menzies Scholars, the Chairman welcomed Sir Ninian and Lady Stephen as guests of honour, and was pleased to announce the establishment of the Sir Ninian Stephen Menzies Scholarship in International Law in recognition of Sir Ninian's outstanding contributions to Australia as Justice of the High Court, as Governor-General, as an international jurist, and as a past Chairman of the Foundation. Professor Simon Maddocks, a Board Member, reflected on the importance of the experience of being a Menzies Scholar in his entertaining after-dinner speech. The Chairman spoke in appreciation of Ms Sandra Mackenzie's dedicated service to the Foundation, with a presentation to mark her retirement as General Manager. In reply, Ms Mackenzie spoke evocatively about her experiences with the Foundation and the special relationship with the Menzies scholars over many years.

During 2012, the Foundation convened several working groups to further develop the initiative for better integration of allied health into health care pathways, and to seek funding partners. In parallel with this, the Foundation has confirmed its commitment to fund-raising to support the Sir Ninian Stephen Menzies Scholarship and other Foundation initiatives.

The Foundation also welcomed Professor Alan Cass as director of the Menzies School of Health Research following

the resignation of Professor Jonathan Carapetis, the appointment of Professor Tom Marwick as director of the Menzies Research Institute Tasmania, and Professor Andrew Wilson (Sydney) and Associate Professor Adrian Kay (ANU) as joint directors of the Menzies Centre for Health Policy to succeed Professor Stephen Leeder and Mr Bob Wells.

2012 was also marked by a legal agreement with the Sir Robert Menzies Memorial Trust in London to allow the Foundation to take over full responsibility for the UK scholarships following the wind-up of the Trust and the transfer of Trust assets to the Foundation on 31 December 2012.

At year's end, it is our pleasure to acknowledge the valuable contributions of all honorary directors of the Foundation, and our dedicated office staff during 2012.

The Foundation was greatly saddened by the deaths of Professor Richard Gye AO (December 2012) and Mr Basil Atkinson AM (January 2013) who both rendered outstanding service as past directors.

The Menzies School of Health Research (Menzies) is committed to improving Indigenous health and wellbeing, with a 27-year history of scientific discovery and public health achievement. In 2012 Menzies has continued to collaborate broadly, partnering across Northern Australia and the Asia-Pacific to create resources and develop local skills with Indigenous and non-Indigenous partners.

A highlight of 2012 was the appointment of the leading kidney researcher, Professor Alan Cass to succeed Professor Jonathan Carapetis as Director of Menzies. As an alumnus from Menzies, and with recent experience at the George Institute for Global Health, Professor Cass brings a deep understanding of Indigenous health and Indigenous communities.

The high quality of Menzies' research output was recognised in the Australian Government's 2012 Excellence in Research for Australia (ERA) initiative. Menzies received a 'five out of five', ranking the institution's performance in medical and health sciences as 'outstanding', and 'well above world standard' based on Menzies work

conducted through the affiliation with Charles Darwin University.

The past 12 months saw Menzies continue its excellent trajectory in addressing important issues including:

- Nationwide public consultations on Indigenous suicide prevention with over 500 people. This resulted in the report National Indigenous Suicide Prevention Strategy which we delivered to the Australian Government;
- Research into smoking habits among Indigenous Australians, revealing a massive decline in heavy smoking, as well as a spike in successful quitting rates;
- Following evidence that cancer is now the second leading cause of death among our Indigenous population, Menzies has stepped up research efforts in this area, identifying key barriers to accessing care and pinpointing the high priority support needed by Indigenous cancer patients;
- Completion of a 20-year collaborative analysis of the malaria *Pknowlesi*, the largest prospective study on knowlesi malaria to date. This specie, we found, presents an increasing threat to health in the Asia-Pacific, yet, more optimistically, responds successfully to intravenous drug treatment.

Menzies was awarded 12 competitive NHMRC grants valued at more than \$9m to help improve outcomes for disadvantaged populations in Australia and the Asia-Pacific region. One in two of grant applications were successful, which is well above the national success rate.

Menzies has made great progress on the new \$47m building project, which will support its growing workforce and enable the institution to continue its vital medical research in world class facilities.



2012 was a landmark year for Menzies Research Institute Tasmania (Menzies) with the arrival of our new Director, the development of a new facility and remarkable research discoveries and grant successes.

Professor Tom Marwick joined Menzies as the new Director in October from the Cleveland Clinic in the USA. He has a distinguished career in cardiovascular health and research.



An immediate focus for Professor Marwick was to reorganise research activity around five major themes that focus on the major diseases affecting the Tasmanian community.

Menzies' staff and students started moving into the \$90 million Medical Science 2 (MS2) building in late 2012. This outstanding facility allows us to double our laboratory space and provide an integrated, state-of-the-art clinical research facility.

2012 was the most successful funding year in Menzies' 24-year history and reflects the scientific competitiveness of our research. Menzies secured \$8.5 million from 13 NHMRC grants for research projects commencing in 2013.

Our researchers were key to a number of significant research discoveries that:

- Found a new link between multiple sclerosis (MS) treatment and vitamin D. The international collaborative study suggests that one of the main treatments for MS may also increase the amount

of vitamin D patients receive from sun exposure.

- Showed smoke from landscape fires is an important contributor to deaths worldwide.
- Discovered new genes that may play a role in adding to the risk of Alzheimer's disease in older people up to 20 years before clinical symptoms become apparent.
- Showed that childhood obesity does not permanently increase cardiovascular risk if children become non-obese adults. The National Institutes of Health (USA) named this research, published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, as one of two major advances in cardiovascular epidemiology for 2012.
- Found that the Devil Facial Tumour Disease that affects the Tasmanian devil population is a relatively stable cancer and has fewer mutations than some human cancers.
- Uncovered two molecules in human platelets that work together to kill malaria.
- Identified numerous genes underlying the risk of osteoporosis.

Collaboration plays an important role at Menzies with a new partnership between Menzies and China's Anhui Medical University (AMU) being established in 2012. A scholarship program has since been introduced that will enable AMU postgraduate students to come to Menzies to undertake their PhD studies.

Research activity will continue to primarily focus on the major diseases affecting the Tasmanian community and beyond, including arthritis, cancer, dementia, diabetes, heart disease, mental health and multiple sclerosis, and international collaborations will be further strengthened and developed.

Menzies Centre of Health Policy



2012 was a year of change and renewal for the Menzies Centre for Health Policy (MCHP). In August, Associate Professor Adrian Kay was appointed as the new Director for the MCHP (ANU) and this was shortly followed by the announcement of a new Director for MCHP (Sydney), Professor Andrew Wilson, to commence early in 2013. Mr Bob Wells has maintained a close relationship with the Centre and Professor Stephen Leeder will remain with MCHP (Sydney). MCHP (ANU) has moved to the Crawford School for Public Policy and will focus on the themes of: global and transnational health policy; accountability and performance; and governing health risks beyond ministries of health.

Highlights of a strong program of public events included the Menzies Oration held at ANU, given by Professor Anne Rogers from the University of Manchester: *Social networks, patient work and resources for the management of long-term conditions: a framework and implications for health policy*. Professor Richard Deckelbaum from Columbia University presented a guest lecture for the Sydney Health Policy Network and the Charles Perkins Centre on *The Cost of the Double Burden: Under and over nutrition worldwide*. The Emerging Health Research Conference showcased a range of cross-disciplinary research in the field of health policy, with the keynote given by Professor Stephen Simpson on the topic "Putting the balance back into diet". The ST Lee lecture was presented by Professor Kai Hong Phua from the National University of Singapore, Health Systems and

The SCIPPS team won the Closing the Gap in Aboriginal Health Through Excellence in Research, Evaluation and Building Evidence Award, at the NSW 2012 Aboriginal Health Awards for their qualitative study of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with chronic illnesses.

*The SCIPPS team partnered with the Western Sydney Local Health District, the Mount Druitt Aboriginal Medical Service and the Winnunga Nimmityjah Aboriginal Health Service in Canberra to explore and document the experience of chronic illness for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and produce the community report *People I Can Call On: Experiences of Chronic Illness*.*

Population Ageing in the Asia-Pacific Region: *Challenges and Policy Options for the Future*; he was then invited as a guest to ANU for a round table discussion. The Sydney Health Policy Network conference in November focused on the progress of the health reform agenda.

Researchers at MCHP continued to publish well, with a high volume of articles on national and international health policy issues. MCHP (ANU) was awarded an ARC Discovery grant with the title: *The making and unmaking of Australian public policy: using historical institutionalism theory to understand the path from Medibank to Medicare*. The project aims to improve our understanding of how and why healthcare reform succeeds and fails.

There was a strong cohort of early career researchers working at MCHP and nine PhD students were underway at the end of the year, supervised by MCHP staff. The Masters of Health Policy at Sydney also enjoyed another year of growth.

The Menzies Oration on Higher Education

Professor Janice Reid AM, Vice-Chancellor, University of Western Sydney delivered the Sir Robert Menzies Oration on Higher Education at the University of Melbourne on 28 October. Her presentation linked the higher education achievements of Menzies to the later achievements of Whitlam and provided the audience with a timely reminder that education is too important to be submerged in partisan politics. The Oration also attested to the vision and quiet leadership of Professor Reid in higher education in Australia.

The annual Menzies Oration on Higher Education was established in 1991 in recognition of the many prime ministerial contributions of Sir Robert Menzies to higher education and his role as Chancellor of the University of Melbourne from 1967 to 1972.

Menzies Allied Health Sciences Grants

The Foundation offers an early career grant of \$25,000, available on a competitive basis to Menzies Scholars in the Allied Health Sciences within 5 years after completion of their PhD.

In 2012, grants were awarded to Dr Josephine Barbaro and to Dr Maria McCarthy.

Dr Josephine Barbaro, Menzies scholar in 2006, will use the grant to conduct a study evaluating the efficacy of the Social Attention and Communication Study-Revised in

identifying infants and toddlers with Autism Spectrum Disorders.

The research will be undertaken at the Olga Tennison Autism Research Centre at La Trobe University.

Dr Maria McCarthy, Menzies scholar in 2007, will use her early career grant to fund a project at the RCH Children's Cancer Centre and the Murdoch Childrens Research Institute.

Maria's project is aimed at understanding the psychosocial outcomes for sibling donors and non-donors of children requiring bone marrow transplantation from a related donor, a life saving treatment for childhood malignancies and blood disorders.

MENZIES SCHOLARSHIP AND FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

Allied Health Sciences

The Sir Robert Menzies Memorial Research Scholarship in the Allied Health Sciences is open to graduates who have completed the first stage of their doctoral program at an Australian university.

Mrs Verity Pacey, a senior physiotherapist at The Children's Hospital at Westmead, is looking into the management and treatment of the connective tissue disease known as hypermobility or loose joints. The award will help Verity complete her PhD at The University of Sydney.

Engineering and Law

The Sir Robert Menzies Memorial Scholarships to the United Kingdom are awarded by the Menzies Foundation in co-operation with the Department of Industry, Innovation, Science, Research and Tertiary Education.

Engineering

Ms Mahala McLindin, a water resources engineer with Sinclair Knight Merz (SKM) in Sydney, will attend the School of Geography and Environment, University of Oxford, to undertake a one-year MSc in Water Science, Policy and Management. Mahala has worked on integrated regional water planning projects and designs for stormwater harvesting. Menzies Centenary Prize

The Menzies Centenary Prize was initiated in 1994 to mark the centenary of Sir Robert Menzies' birth in Jeparit. It is awarded to a Year 12 student from Dimboola Memorial Secondary College as a contribution to the cost of the first and second years of tertiary study.

MENZIES MEMORIAL SCHOLARS ASSOCIATION

The MMSA's AGM on 29 November 2012 at Clarendon Terrace provided Scholars with an opportunity to hear about the Foundation's activities and to discuss ways in which Scholars could assist the Foundation's efforts to further its activities. The AGM was followed by four inspiring presentations by Menzies Alumni in various disciplines.

- Dr John Hooper (Medicine, 2000) presented on "Tackling Cancer Metastasis – One Step at a Time". John explained the process of metastasis and how this makes it difficult to develop curative therapies; how a successful collaborative model had enabled identification of the molecular drivers, and to the development of treatment of metastasis in prostate, ovarian and colorectal cancer.

- Justin Hogan-Doran (Law 1998) discussed private international law in cyberspace. Justin outlined the main elements of disputes involving private parties with foreign dimensions, and how these elements might be applied in the context of the Internet. Internet transactions posed particular problems because the Internet is generally regarded as "anational", "aspatial", with no clear jurisdictional boundaries. These problems require consideration because of the large number of Internet users and the rapid growth of e-commerce.

- Dr Anne-Marie Hill (AHS, 2008) spoke about "The role of patient education in reducing falls in older populations". Vulnerable older people tended to view falls post-discharge from hospital as "accidents" whereas health professionals considered that falls could be mitigated through appropriate education. Anne-Marie is involved in a Menzies Pilot Trial to determine whether education can reduce the rate of falls after discharge.
- Dr Stephanie Ward (Harvard, Medicine, 2009) explained how a large ageing population, decreasing birth rate and increases in life expectancy have increased the importance of geriatric medicine. Stephanie is currently involved in a study known as ASPREE (Aspirin in Reducing Events in the Elderly) which is considering whether aspirin can prolong a healthy life.

Scholars later recognised and thanked Ms Sandra Mackenzie for her extraordinary contribution to the Foundation and, particularly, the MMSA for over three decades. The day culminated in the Awards Dinner at Clarendon Terrace, where medals were presented to the 2012 Scholars by Sir Robert Menzies' daughter, Mrs Heather Henderson.

The keynote speaker for the dinner, Professor Simon Maddocks (Medicine, 1987), delighted us with reminiscences of his experience as a Menzies Scholar and particularly how the Menzies Scholarship had "opened doors" for him. Simon concluded his speech with a heartfelt tribute to Sandra Mackenzie. Sandra then explained her growing awareness of the tangible impact of the Foundation's activities and the Menzies legacy through some seminal moments in her career. Sandra will be missed by all of us.
